A huge thank you to our ESSP conference partner and sponsor for making this Professional Development event a reality!



## Wall Walk—Unpacking the Grade 9 and Beyond **Graduation/Post Graduation Plan**



In the wall walk activity conference delegates took a closer look at the contents of the Grade 9 Grad/Post Graduation plan. This activity was an opportunity to discuss and share ideas, activities and best practices in each area of the plan:

Looking Within . . . Personal Inventories & Activities (ex. Skills, interests, Multiple Intelligences, learning styles, etc.)

Looking at the Facts

- Grade 10 12 Course Options
- Grade 11 and 12 course options outlined as possibilities with a tentative schedule for completing the graduation requirements
- Understanding of pre-requisites to secondary courses and graduation requirements

Looking for Information .

- Identify Areas of Interest
- Exploration of a broad range of career pathways

Looking at Strengths . . .Personal career documentation such as a resume, cover letter, Young Workers Readiness Certificate, etc.

Looking to the Future . . . Stated goals for school, personal and/or community belonging and engagement for the current year and beyond.

Looking for Support . . . An opportunity to share and discuss the plan with an identied supportive adult such as a family member, teacher or other trusted adult

#### **Canada Education Savings Program**

Through the Canada Education Savings Program, the Government of Canada encourages early planning and savings for a child's post-secondary education using Registered Education Savings Plans (RESPs). RESP savings grow tax-free until withdrawn to pay for post-secondary education. According to the Government of Canada, research shows that children with education savings are more likely to attend post-secondary education, less likely to have student loans, and usually graduate with less debt.



The Government of Canada offers two savings initiatives linked to RESPs—the Canada Savings Grant and the Canada Learning Bond. The Canada Education Savings Grant is available until the calendar year in which the beneficiary turns 17. It consists of a basic grant of 20% on the first \$2,500 in annual personal contributions as well as an additional amount. This grant is available to all Canadians, regardless of their family income. The Canada Learning Bond is available for children from low-income families born in 2004 or later and provides an initial payment of \$500 plus \$100 for each year of eligibility, up to age 15, for a maximum of \$2,000. Personal contributions are not required to receive the Canada Learning Bond.
