

Sun West Youth Consultation Students Met with Board of Education

This year's Sun West Student Youth Consultation Team conducted focus group

interviews with their peers (Grade 6 to 12) from across our school division in efforts to learn more about 3 areas of "Student Life" that matter to them: Stress Management, Health and Fitness, and Preparing for the Future.



In relation to the Preparing for the Future findings, it was discovered students experience optimism AND anxiety in preparing for their futures. They recognize a number of career-related courses and division supports which help them with the life career planning process such as Middle Level Career Education classes, CWEX classes, DLC off-site work-based courses, personal finance locally developed elective, life transitions classes, access to Career Counsellors, Career Development portfolio development, etc.

However, they proposed to our Sun West Board of Education that, based on findings, they recommend further development of life/career and personal finance courses to help better prepare students for the future. While existing supports work and should continue, they suggested it would be an amazing idea to create a Career Development/Financial Literacy/Life Transitions skills-based course and to have it become a required credit class (or classes) towards high school graduation both within our School Division AND Province to help ALL students prepare for their future.

Summer school at Sun West DLC creates a unique opportunity for learners to recover credits or pick up additional credits in a concentrated period of time.

During the six weeks from July 4 to August 15, students will be responsible to complete all course work and write the final exam

Sun West School Division -Distance Learning Centre

Dual Credit courses are recognized by both high school and post-secondary institutions. Although it is offered at the high school level, a dual credit is actually a college or university class. Typically, it is delivered by a post-secondary instructor with additional learning and technical supports offered by the DLC teacher. These courses carry a heavier workload and assessments are held to a higher standard than in a regular high school course.

All dual credit course materials are accessible online. Course layout and structure will vary as each was developed by a different educator and/or stem from different post-secondary institutions.

These courses require a high degree of independent study with occasional group work that will be coordinated by the instructor.

The opportunity for young people to experience the rigor and intensity of a college or university course before immersing themselves in post high-school environments, helps with transitioning. In addition to the newly acquired knowledge, these learning experiences facilitate the development of effective study habits and time management skills that contribute to success in the post-secondary world.

Dual Credits courses offered through the Sun West DLC abide by a unique schedule and have post-secondary tuition fees attached. Visit the DLC website to learn more about enrolment, pricing, and course schedules.







Student Career News

Student Career News and Post-Secondary Updates graciously shared by Kerri Binetruy of Prairie South School Division

- 1. University of Regina, University of Saskatchewan and Saskatchewan Polytechnic health and dental plans are automatically applied to student fees in the fall. Students can opt out of them by providing proof that they are covered by an equivalent plan. This can provide a savings of about \$250. To opt out, complete the appropriate form in September.
- Saskatchewan Polytechnic Plan Program Play workshop invites students in grades 9 12 to explore computer programming and create games. Students will learn about the gaming industry, the job market, and emerging computer interfaces like mobile devices. This workshop will run from July 19-21 in Moose Jaw and July 5-7 in Regina. Post-Secondary Updates

UNIVERSITY OF REGINA:

Students attending in the fall are invited to join in the U of R Orientation activities on September 5. This is guaranteed to be a fun day filled with helpful sessions, food and prizes. This is the best way to begin your post-secondary adventure as it provides opportunities to mix and mingle with students and professors. Student who register before June 30 will be entered into a dra to win an IPad mini!

The Summer Bridge Program will give new students a chance to experience the University of Regina campus before the fall semester starts, and will give them an opportunity to develop their academic skills before taking on a full-load of classes. The program incorporates academics, university preparation, and social activities to prepare students to be successful at the University of Regina. The program runs from August 8-29. Students will complete their English 100 course for credit. Cost is \$750 for those students living in residence in the fall and \$800 for those attending but not staying in residence. Book cost ranges from \$75-125 (extra).

SASKATCHEWAN POLYTECHNIC:

Students enrolled in a certificate or diploma program can apply for scholarships starting August 1. The application deadline for these scholarships is September 15.

Easy Start Transition Workshop for Students Who Require Accessibility Services will be taking place in Regina and Saskatoon on June 6, Moose Jaw on June 7, and Prince Albert on June 8th. This workshop will provide students living with a disability information on academic accommodations, documentation requirements, financial assistance and assistive technology. This summer, Sask Polytechnic is offering a variety of Summer Camps throughout their campuses. Students are encouraged to check out the page and register for these hands on learning experiences!

UNIVERSITY OF SASKATCHEWAN:

Orientation for new students will be held on Sept. 1st and 5th. Students attending the U of S this fall won't want to miss this interactive and fun event. It is the best way to ensure your life as a university student begins on the right track. Registration for orientation will open in August.

GREAT PLAINS COLLEGE:

The deadline for the Grade 11 Early Entrance Award is June 30. Grade 11 students who apply may receive an additional Early Entrance Award of \$1,000 (must apply before June 30 and have a 70% or higher academic average).
