Sask. Careers Websystem Update

The official Media launch of the SaskCareers.ca website is scheduled for November 7, 2014at Marion Graham Collegiate in Saskatoon. With phase 1 of the website now complete, the SaskCareers website is on its way to becoming an invaluable resource for all Saskatchewan residents. It is important to remember that because of the large number of stakeholders and the broad target audience, it will take time for this resource to reach its full potential. The website has had, what it is called in the Information Communication Technology industry, a *soft launch*. Currently, it is being piloted in eight school divisions, coupled with research and testing taking place within two First Nations communities

The website focuses on four critical sections relating to the career development process: In the first section *Know Yourself* there are assessments that will assist the use to discover their strengths, interests and learning styles. The next section, *Discover Career Path*, provides information on 16 key industry sectors of the Saskatchewan economy. This section allows the user to access information about potential careers within a sector or research specific occupations. The third section of the site, *Explore Education & Training*, provides the user with access to a high school planner, information on post-secondary options, education programs and scholarships. Because course options will vary from one institution to another It is important to note that the high school planner will have to be integrated with each school or division course or class lists. The final section, *Connect with Employers*, will be populated over time with employer information, career information, labour market information, and potential ways in which employers would be willing to work with students or education systems.

There is also an online e-portfolio built into the site and integrated with the all the components, including any favourites selected by the user as they explore the sections of the site (For example: High School Planner, Post-Secondary Planner or Occupational search).

Future phases will include:

Onboarding information to the scholarship section and the employer/business section.

Development of a financial literacy section.

Development of a parent and career advisory sections..

Establishing processes for populating the events section of the site.

Development of a logic model evaluation process with built in analytic capabilities.

Integration of resume' builders.

Continued vetting and testing

Development of this websystem is no small undertaking. This websystem has the potential to provide everyone in the province with access to tools, resources, career pathing information, labour market information and communication/collaboration information that will directly and positively impact the prosperity of Saskatchewan.

Regina District Industry Education Council (RDIEC)

Since the RDIEC office was established in October 2013 a great deal has been accomplished. A fourteen member board has been established with equal representation from industry and education. The board has met several times ratifying RDIEC Bylaws, approving the Policy and Procedures Manual, establishing committees and beginning a strategic planning process.

Six RDIEC programs were established in 2013-14 reaching 3346 students directly, partnering with 53 outside organizations resulting in over 1400 in-kind hours of direct student contact time by industry. Highlights included:

- "Grade 9 Try a Career Days" with approximately 3000 grade 9 students from the Regina Region attending the event over three days.
- Twenty one Career Spotlights were completed, surpassing the goal of 20 set at the beginning of the year.
- Two Career Connection programs completed with the ground work done to double the number of Career Connection programs offered in 2014-2015. Four students went on to complete a work placement and earn Career & Work Exploration credits with three of the placements facilitated during the summer.
- 100% completion by our 19 Summer Apprenticeship Program students resulting in 37 Credits being issued.
- Very positive feedback on the first ever RDIEC Small Engine Summer Skills Camp for middle level students.
- The establishment of a structure to facilitate coordination of the UR Accelerated Program by the RDIEC in 2014-15.
- New for 2014-15 will be a Spring Job Expo, Health Links Program, and a Parents as Career Coaches event accompanying the expansion of current program offerings.
