

2021 SCWEA Awards

SCWEA Award of Excellence

Every year the Award of Excellence is presented to the SCWEA member who has made the most outstanding contribution to the development and promotion of Career and Work Education in Saskatchewan. This year's recipient, **Bill Birns**, has worked as a teacher for 21 years and as a Career Counsellor in the field of career development for 16 years. Bill made his debut in the world of career development teaching Career/Work Exploration courses to grade 10s at Robert Southey School. He advocated for the course to be mandatory for all grade 10 students in his school and worked diligently to find meaningful work placements for them.

Bill transitioned to an itinerant career counsellor in 2014 and has served in over ten schools in Prairie Valley School Division. Currently, Bill is the career counsellor at Greenall High School in Balgonie, engaging his students in various levels of career development. He is eager to help students, parents, and staff alike and is very knowledgeable about everything career-related. No task is too small or too big for Bill. If he does not know the answer he will find it. Bill's favourite message to students is: "You all have futures!" Bill can often be heard telling students that he doesn't want them living out of the backseat of their cars, eating cheese doodles. VIRTUAL REALITY CAREER SIMULATIONS


Daniel Price from the Regina Work Prep Centre spoke to us about Virtual Reality (VR) in the province. Saskatchewan is leading the way in the Virtual Reality department in career development!


Virtual Reality is immersive technology that allows a person to try out a career without any inhibitions and to explore careers they wouldn't have typically been exposed to. At the Regina Work Prep Centre, they see more females being exposed to trades than would have been captured by trying the trade itself, breaking down stereotypes that exist. Some participants will try VR and then circle back to try out the trade in real life.

The mobile nature of VR technology allows students and work seekers to try out a career and talk about the labour market information - the jobs available and average salary. Participants can be anywhere from 13 to 80 years of age! In a typical session, the participant spends 20 minutes or so in the VR career simulation while the VR operator guides the career exploration. Afterwards, the participant and the operator have a conversation about the experience, discussing what went well and what was challenging. Often the VR simulation creates an experience of honest self awareness for the participants.

Main benefits of VR career simulation: Accessibility. Lowers one's inhibitions to try a career. Helps to develop self awareness of one's (transferable) skills.

Saskatchewan is helping to forge the path VR can go in career development and the technology is available across the province. CHATTERHIGH, SKILLS CANADA, AND SK'S MOST INFORMED STUDENT/SCHOOL COMPETITION

Colin Phippard, the Executive Director of Skills Canada spoke to us about the competition they ran in partnership with ChatterHigh this fall - "Saskatchewan's Most Informed Student" alongside the national competition "Canada's Most Informed Student".

ChatterHigh is a simple interface that pays students to learn. Skills Canada partnered with ChatterHigh to offer this competition to steer students in exploration of careers. Saskatchewan was third in the country in terms of uptake and our students had over 13,000 clicks in career development!

Lee Taal from ChatterHigh showed us the interface and explained the purpose behind both the interface and the competitions. ChatterHigh exists to help students build knowledge and build fluency. As students participate in the "seek-and-find" activities, they gain more confidence in their ability to explore and get information from websites about different careers. The activities try to push students past the most visible jobs (ie. teacher, doctor, lawyer) and help students to discover more possibilities.

ChatterHigh exposes students to so many different resources and career opportunities. Students can interact with interface daily as bellwork. There is a daily quiz with an informative question that takes them to a website. Students can also work through questions in 48 categories. Once a student works through 300 questions, the reports are unlocked. Parents and students can also participate.

Deborah Deacon finished up the presentation by talking about the free Mental Health Modules for students and educators. ChatterHigh now has daily quizzes about Mental Health. The quizzes are fun and engaging in ChatterHigh's signature, incentivized way. ChatterHigh will also work with school divisions to create their own questions to help students explore local mental health resources. 



Teaching during a pandemic has led us to be creative in the ways that we reach our students. Here are some of our favourite platforms we've learned how to use/used more of in the past two years:

<u>ChatterHigh</u> – An online resource with games, quizzes, and competitions for students to increase their ability to make mindful higher education and careers decisions.

<u>Data Dashboards</u> – The Labour Market Info Council is dedicated to enhancing the availability and relevance of labour market info students need in the career decision making process.

<u>Everfi</u> – Everfi empowers educators to bring real world learning and equip students with the skills they need for success. It is free for teachers to sign up and use with their students. Courses are available in financial literacy, college and career readiness, social emotional learning, and mental well-being.

Google Sites – Build internal project hubs, public-facing websites, and more – all without IT help. With Google Sites, building a website is so easy! Just drag the content where you need it. Google Sites can be a great place to store career development information for parents and students to access.

<u>Junior Achievement</u> – Junior Achievement's programs teach youth about financial literacy, entrepreneurship, and work readiness, and support the curriculum in Saskatchewan. The free online programs can be accessed in two ways: self directed or teacher led.

<u>Let's Talk Science</u> - is committed to developing youth who are creative, critical thinkers, and knowledgeable citizens prepared to participate and thrive in a complex global environment. Excellent free resources for educators and career resources for STEM careers.

<u>Loom</u> – a free platform you can use to record instructional videos on your screen, cam, or both. Be sure to sign up using your educator email and to request the free upgraded educator account.

<u>myBlueprint</u> – All students in Saskatchewan have access to myBlueprint, an online based portfolio and career education resource. Students can research careers, create a resume, or plan their high school classes all on this user-friendly platform.

Remind – Send messages that students and parents can't miss – directly to their phones! Remind allows you to manage multiple different classrooms and create messages to be sent live or at a scheduled time.

RBC Future Launch at Home – Virtual programs to keep students engaged in future development at home. Opportunities include a Future Launch summit, skills development, financial literacy, networking, mental well-being, and the Future Launch Scholarship.

<u>Think Ag/Ag in the Classroom</u> - strives to increase awareness and cultivate curiosity in agriculture and food careers among teens across the country by connecting educators, parents, and our sector partners with learning tools and interactive experiences that are curriculum-linked.

<u>Wakelet</u> – A great collaborative website that helps change the way you and your students find, store, and organize information on the web. Use the platform to gather research, create digital portfolios, tell digital stories, distribute newsletters, and much more!
